Activities such as Getting-to-Know-You Bingo, in which students find peers who match specific descriptors on their bingo cards, promote engagement and interaction (12).

- **Physical Activity Icebreakers:** Games such as Blobs and Lines, where students group themselves based on shared interests or characteristics, keep them moving and talking, fostering connections in an energetic way (15, 16).
- **Fun Challenges:** Engaging activities like the Cup Challenge, where teams compete to stack cups in specific formations, can enhance collaboration and problem-solving skills while breaking down social barriers (17, 18).

- **Story Stitching:** In small groups, each student receives a picture that contributes to a larger story. They must describe their picture without revealing it, working together to create a coherent narrative (20).
- **Human Bingo:** Similar to People Bingo, this variation uses statements like "Speaks more than two languages." This encourages students to interact and learn interesting facts about one another (37).
- **Two Truths and a Lie:** Each student shares two true statements and one false statement about themselves. The group then guesses which statement is the lie, fostering creativity and storytelling (8).
- **Marshmallow Challenge:** Teams use spaghetti, tape, string, and a

marshmallow to build the tallest freestanding structure that can support the marshmallow on top. This activity promotes teamwork and problem solving (9).

- **Concentric Circles:** Arrange students in two circles facing each other. Pose fun questions (e.g., "What's your favorite book?") for pairs to discuss before rotating partners for new conversations (19).
- **Three of a Kind:** Students find three classmates with whom they share something in common (excluding visible traits). This activity helps uncover shared interests and experiences (20).
- **Shed Your Problems Away:** Students write down a current problem on paper, which is then collected and redistributed randomly. Each student reads someone else's problem aloud, allowing the class to brainstorm solutions together (37).
- **Emoji Buddies:** Students find others with matching emoji cards and then participate in trivia games about each other's interests, promoting connections in a fun way (9).
- **72 Seconds of Fun:** Students have 72 seconds to meet as many peers as possible, learning names, majors, and interests during brief interactions (8).

These activities not only break the ice but also encourage communication, collaboration, and a sense of community among students in the classroom setting.
